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"CHALK WOULD BE A MIRACLE"

"Chalk would be a miracle" has always been the by-line for the charity. However, in these unprecedented times the Maasai are now thinking "Visitors would be a miracle". The effect of Coronavirus is being felt throughout the world. Words like 'unprecedented times', 'furlough', 'lockdown', 'social distancing', 'self-isolate' have become all too familiar in recent months. After the initial shock of the pandemic our thoughts turned to our Maasai friends. In Kenya the borders have been locked to overseas visitors. This has meant that hotels and camps have had to shut, which has



meant that local staff have had to be laid off, which has meant no income, which has meant that it has been extremely difficult for families to buy food.

With your generous support we have been able to send over £18,000 to buy emergency supplies, including face masks, soap, hand sanitizer, maize meal, rice, beans, sugar, tea etc





Over 80 most needy families in the Mara Rianda area and Enkereri have been identified. With the unfailing support of Governors' Camp these supplies were distributed. It has been wonderful to see these beautiful people, with their masked faces, socially distancing and receiving the desperately needed essential supplies. They have each received six deliveries so far and hopefully more can be made.

Some people in the Mara Rianda community have tested positive for Coronavirus, but thankfully to our knowledge there have been no deaths from the virus in the area.

We understand that the medical centre, which we funded the building of, is seeing increasing cases of malnutrition in children. The medical centre sends out community volunteers to advise on the importance of hygiene. This is so difficult as so many families live in manyatta's (An enclosed circle of houses) without access to clean water.

The Mamas (the term used for Maasai ladies) still have to travel to a local stream or river to access water or even large puddles. So there is no running taps whilst hand washing and singing 'Happy Birthday' three times. (For those supporters not from the UK this was part of our initial advice in managing the virus).

Like many of you, Pola and I have been able to work from home and are very grateful that we have everything we need and much more.

The Kenyan Government closed all schools in March and they will not reopen until January 2021. Fortunately we have been able to use this time to carry out repainting and maintenance work at both the Mara Rianda and Enkereri primary schools.

There is concern that some teenage girls may have married during this time, frequently without choice, but following their father's wishes which is custom. Dowries are paid by the groom to the bride's parents and during this time money is scarce.

We have also been able to have new desks made and delivered to Olpurkel where there is a very small rural primary school. Frequently some of the students are taught under a tree.

Layna Justice Sedera, the head teacher at this school, was a former pupil at Mara Rianda Primary school. We did not know him at that time but from our frequent visits he certainly knew Pola and I and the work of the charity.

A generous specific donation was recently received to purchase some much needed equipment for the Maternity Centre, and here is Patience being weighed on the new scales.

We have also been able to provide a haematology analyser, oxygen equipment and suction equipment as well as an oil filled heater. When the temperature drops below 20°C our Maasai friends find it very cold!

I would like to take this opportunity to thank our local community workers Julius and Francis (one of our former students) for being our eyes, ears and untiring helpers. They both work for Governors' Camp who very generously allow them to help the charity.

We were so very sad to hear that Josephine, one of our former secondary school students had died from what is believed to be malaria complications. After finishing her education at Maasai Girls Secondary School Josephine became an excellent teacher at a preschool local to Mara Rianda. Sadly, she had only recently had a baby boy called Stephen who is now being looked after by her family. We and the community are immensely sad.

Support is always welcome and greatly appreciated. There is always a need for new books, sports equipment and general school supplies as well as assistance with capital projects.
